Completing your MA degree

Students will create a list of ten substantial works that they will read over the summer and the year. We encourage them to read things they have not studied with us, things that they have always wanted to read but have not had a chance to read, or things that are particular, unique, marginal and would not therefore turn up in a syllabus. Given their future directions, they might do well to use this exam to build a base of texts for further graduate work or teaching.

They will be asked to choose one excerpt that they will identify for us at least two weeks before the exam date.

During the exam they will present a close reading and explanation of the text they have chosen. They will link that excerpt and text to other texts on their list and other texts they have studied with us in their seminars.

If they plan on pursuing a K12 teaching career, one part of the exam should address how this text or a text like it might be used in the K12 classroom. Exam time 1 hour.

Completing Licensure & Endorsements

In addition to coursework, candidates must meet the following requirements for licensure and world language/DLI endorsement:

Proof of Language Proficiency

Language proficiency is demonstrated by completing an Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI).

A minimum of Advanced-Low is required (for WL) and Advanced-Mid (DLI). The Utah State Office of Education has approved the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Language (ACTFL) oral proficiency interview (OPI) and the Utah Foreign Language Association (UFLA) language proficiency certification.

Praxis Tests

Candidates for licensure must pass Praxis II tests in ESL (5174) in ESL and French (with a minimum of 160)

Funding Opportunities for future immersion teachers (FIT grant)

A faculty member or administrator from the Partner University will support the candidate's application. The faculty member or administrator will complete the Nominating Faculty or Administrator section of the application and will also complete a letter of support for the candidate. The candidate will submit this Application to the French Section, along with their CV (in English or French) and the Letter of Support (in English or French).

Internship with the Académie de Grenoble, France

Students will have the chance to attend a French/English DLI school in the Académie de Grenoble after the spring semester. The internship will be completed before the end of June. Students are responsible for their own airfare.
